Good luck this year to all those returning to school – both virtually and in-person.



On Saturday, July 25, 2020. EFASCE di Pordenone (EdiPN) held the 43rd Annual Convention in a completely new format – Streaming online! This year's theme, *Connessi per creare il future* - Connections for creating our future.

EdiPN President, Gino Gregoris said “We did not want to skip a year, rather, we took this difficult time as the opportunity to communicate more with each other and above all to experience this moment as a new beginning.”

Famous Italians

Filippo Mazzei - “Godfather” of the Declaration of Independence, was born in Poggio a Caiano, a town and comune in the Province of Prato, in the Tuscany region of Italy, on December 25, 1730. He died in [Pisa](#), Italy on March 19, 1816. He was a surgeon, a merchant, a language teacher, an agriculturist, a writer, and a diplomat. Filippo Mazzei was an intellectual who spoke several languages and knew art, architecture and literature. He studied medicine in [Florence](#) and practiced in Italy and the [Middle East](#) for several years before moving to [London](#) in 1755 to take up a career as an importer and teacher of Italian language.



Mazzei became friends with Benjamin Franklin and John Adams in England. While doing work for Franklin, Mazzei shared his idea of importing Tuscan products to the New World. In 1773, Franklin and Adams convinced the Italian to move to the colonies, where Mazzei bought part of Thomas Jefferson's Monticello estate to cultivate wine, olives and silkworms. Mazzei and Jefferson created what would become the first commercial vineyard in Virginia. In 1779 Mazzei returned to Italy as an unofficial ambassador and secret agent for the state of Virginia. He purchased and shipped arms to them until 1783. He credited with securing France's assistance during the American Revolution and his plan for capturing the British in New York that was executed at Yorktown. After briefly visiting the [United States](#) again in 1785, Mazzei travelled throughout Europe promoting Republican ideals. He wrote a political history of the American Revolution, '*Recherches historiques et politiques sur les Etats-Unis de l'Amerique septentrionale*', and published it in [Paris](#) in 1788. After its publication Mazzei became an unofficial roving ambassador in Europe for American ideas and institution.

Forming a close friendship with his neighbor Jefferson, who spoke Italian, Mazzei shared his political leanings in writings at Jefferson's urging. In 1774, Mazzei wrote an essay in the Virginia Gazette that suggested, "***All men are by nature equally free and independent. This equality is necessary in order to create a free government. All men must be equal to each other in natural rights.***" Many scholars credit Mazzei with the phrase “all men are created equal,” which Jefferson incorporated in the Declaration of Independence. The phrase appears in Mazzei's writings several years before Jefferson, with whom Mazzei shared a lifetime of correspondence, wrote the nation's founding document. John F. Kennedy credited Mazzei for the writing in his book, "A Nation of Immigrants."

Mazzei received little attention for his contributions to the nation's founding. His face was placed on a 40-cent U.S. airmail stamp in 1980, to commemorate the 250th anniversary of his birth. His name was also given to a World War II-era Navy cargo ship.

MANDI, il saluto friulano che equivale al ciao, soprattutto i turisti d'estate mi chiedono spesso il significato di questa parola. Ci sono varie interpretazioni, una corrisponderebbe a "nelle mani di Dio" o nelle "mani degli Dei", l'altra dicono derivi dal latino "mane dui" ovvero che tu rimanga (su questa terra) a lungo...

MANDI, the Friulian greeting that equals hello, especially summer tourists often ask me the meaning of this word. There are various interpretations, one would correspond to "in the hands of God" or in the "hands of the Gods", the other they say comes from the Latin "mane dui" meaning that you stay (on this earth) for a long time...
