In this newsletter we'll continue to present English translations of older Furlan rhymes & poems. I heard this poem several times from my Father. Lisa Roman remembers her Nonno Dante saying it also. The Furlan wording and spelling of the poem were taken from "La Valle del Colvera", page 150.

La LunaThe MoonVostu chi t'in disi una?Do you want me to tell you one?Vuarda la Luna!Look at the moon!Vostu chi t'in disi un'altra?Do you want me to tell you another?Vuarda ce alta!Look how high!

In a future newsletter, I'd like to present some of the sayings of our Parents, Grandparents, or older relatives and friends. If you have a favorite saying from long ago, that you'd like to share with our members, please send it to us. To start, here's one I often heard as a kid (I think Dad got it from his Mother)" Idonno a la muarta in Vienna".

Request from one of our members -

Rina Fesnak called to ask for some help with two old children's rhymes. The Nona of a friend of Rina's used to say rhymes to her, as a child, that she can't remember the words to. Hopefully, one of these sounds familiar to someone.

In the first rhyme, the child would hold out their open palm and the Nona would make a circle on the child's palm, with her index finger, while reciting the rhyme. I asked around, and the only one to have any memories of a similar rhyme was Naomi Houseal, and she told me that the rhyme she remembers had something to do with a ball, but she couldn't remember the words.

The second rhyme had words like" Colon, colon cavale......", where the adult crossed their knees and put a foot out while saying the rhyme. This sounds a lot like when my parents and adult relatives gave us kids a "pony ride" on their lower leg. The child sat on the adult's foot and held on to their shin, while the adult would extend and retract their leg; giving the child a "pony ride". I don't remember any words being said while doing this, but it was a lot of fun.

If anyone knows of children's rhymes that sounds like these, please contact us, so that we can continue to pass on these traditions!





Famous Furlans - Mario Andretti

Mario Gabriele Andretti was born on February 28, 1940. He is a renowned race car driver who raced from 1966 – 2000 and has achieved many marvelous things throughout his career.

Along with his twin brother Aldo, the two were born in Montona, Istria which is now modern day Motovun, Croatia. His mother's name is Rina and his father's is Alvise. Back then, Istria was part of the Kingdom of Italy, but it was annexed by Yugoslavia at the end of WWII.

As a result of this, the Andretti family left in 1948 and ended

up in a refugee camp in Lucca, Italy. Andretti talked about the situation to Paul Sterling and said, "My father left everything behind, we left our home and took what we could carry and went further into Italy. They (the Italian government) had to swallow all of these families that were dispersed and they (the Italian government) formed all different camps over Italy and we were shipped to a place in Tuscany."



He also added, "Life was a bit weird at the time but the one thing that my father always did, he always provided for us. As kids we were never cold, we were never hungry, we went to school, he always provided quite well."

When the boys were little, they would run around the kitchen, holding pot-lids and yelling "Vroom! Vroom!" This was before they had seen a car. At the age of five, he and Aldo were racing hand-crafted cars down the streets of their hometown.

At the age of thirteen, Mario got a job parking cars at a garage. He described the experience, "The first time I fired up a car, felt the engine shudder and the wheel come to life in my hands, I was hooked. It was a feeling I can't describe. I still get it every time I get into a race car."

Andretti's first racing experience, also at thirteen years old, was in a youth racing league called Formula Junior in Ancona, Italy.

The Andretti family maintained contact with a relative who lived in the United States for many years. The plan was for the Andretti family to move to the States and then return to Italy after about five years. Mario explains, "When I looked at my life in many ways, out of so many negatives, here comes a positive and this was certainly one of them, here was an opportunity created for us, the kids, and my dad always cited that. He would say in a sense I am looking at your future, where I think would be the best solution for you kids to have opportunities and he was correct, he was right because if we had remained in Italy I don't know whether I could pursue what my first passion was and the only passion I really had career wise."







In 1955, the Andretti family emigrated to the United States of America, settling in Nazareth in Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley. Mario was fifteen years old.

His American racing career spanned five decades and included dirt ovals, asphalt ovals, and road courses. He raced Three Quarter Midgets, sprint cars, open wheel racing cars, sports cars, stock cars and Le Mans racing machines. He won the championship four times.

In his Formula One career, he has raced for Lotus, March, Ferrari, Parnelli, Alfa Romeo and Williams. He has made 131 entries, won one championship in 1978, won 12 times overall, podium19 times.

He is only one of three drivers to have won major races on road courses, paved oval and dirt tracks in one season; a feat he accomplished four times. He also became the first driver to have won Indy Car races in four different decades and the first to win automobile races of any kind in five decades.

Fast forward many years and Mario is now retired. He got married to Dee Ann (Hoch) Andretti and had three children; Michael, Jeff and Barbie. He is a magnificent role model to many young drivers and is living proof that you can do anything if you put your mind to it.

42nd Incontro dei Corregionali all'estero was held in Caneva 27-28 July 2019, with the theme of "Languages of the Emigrants. The roots of taliàn (Le lingue degli emigranti. Le radici del taliàn)"

Friday July 26th there was a meeting at the Municipal Building in Pordenone of all the representatives from abroad with the Board of Efasce di PN and the Vice Mayor of PN.



Saturday, July 27th - Seminar included presentations from the Mayor of Caneva (Andrea Attilio Gava), Professor Carla Marcato of the University of Udine, Vanessa Lovisa-Gambin of Toronto, Argel Rigo Coordinator of EFASCE Brazil; moderated by Enri Lisetto, a journalist with Messagero Veneto. The theme was Languages and how emigrants brought their languages to their new areas of settlement and mixed it with their new languages in an effort to maintain their cultural ties and identities with their homelands.



Following the presentations, the "Odorico da Pordenone" award was given to Argel Rigo of Brazil for his work over 30 years, through institutional actions, participation in initiatives of cultural associations, publication of books and commitment to volunteering, Rigo has been preserving, revitalizing, promoting and disseminating the culture, memory, and traditions of Italy in Brazil.
